Date: Monday, Oct. 3, 10:00 – 12:00 Noon



<u>Course Description</u>: This class allows us to travel vicariously around the Philippine Islands and meet a variety of cultures and peoples. From the Cordillera in northern Luzon to the Muslim territories of southern Mindanao, we will learn of patterns of human interaction and significant values of the Filipino people. Each region offers a unique experience of human interconnectedness of the east and the west, of societies and cultures.

<u>Instructor</u>: Dr. Araceli Suzara is Assistant Professor of Sociology and Criminal Justice at Old Dominion University and Director of the Filipino American Center. She is a frequent presenter to various groups and serves on the boards of several organizations including the Norfolk Sister City Association. Her undergraduate degrees are from Assumption College in the Philippines, and advanced degrees in Sociology from Loyola University.

<u>Course Description</u>: More and more is learned about our magnificent universe each year. The Hubble telescope, the sophisticated celestial probes, and other detection devices have produced immense amount of data on our cosmos. Relive his command and the lives of the key six – three heroes and three harlots – thus, the title!

<u>Instructor</u>: Robert Torgler attended the College of William & Mary and the Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania. He filled senior management positions with IBM for over 30 years and was a Corporate Vice-President before retirement. Mr. Torgler was a senior docent and lecturer at the Smithsonian Museum of American History and the National Archives, specializing in the Revolutionary era.

<u>Course Description</u>: Begun in 1938 through a Works Progress Administration grant and the labor of over 200 African American women and men, the Norfolk Botanical Garden now stretches over 155 acres and contains over 30 themed gardens. Cheryl White, whose Master's research included the Garden's nomination to the National Register of Historic Places, will share details of the Garden's early history and examine its continued importance in the city of Norfolk.

<u>Instructor</u>: Cheryl White is a Hampton Roads native and received a BA in Art History from Old Dominion University in 2003 and MA in Humanities in 2006. Her Master's thesis included the nomination of the Norfolk Botanical Gardens to the National Register of Historic Places, a distinction that was awarded to the Garden in December 2005. Cheryl currently works as the Curatorial Assistant at the Chrysler Museum of Art and teaches art history courses at ODU. She has recently been published by AltDaily.com and RVA Magazine and is active in several local arts organizations including Art Everywhere and Hampton Roads, the Canvas Project.



<u>Course Description</u>: Today we will see how two contemporary artists take traditional landscape painting to new levels. Artist Kim Keever's large scale photographs were created by constructing miniature topographies in a 200-gallon tank filled with water. Colored lights disperse color pigments, producing mystical atmospheres captured by camera. Keever's work has been exhibited at the Metropolitan Museum of Art, MOMA and the Virginia Museum of Fine Arts.

Jean-Pierre Roy's landscapes enlarge on the art of the Hudson River school of paintings. Authentic geographic details blend with fantasy and forces of nature. Light and shadows merge and collide as the real becomes surreal. Roy teaches at the American Academy of Art in New York where his work has been exhibited.

<u>Course Description</u>: The French Revolution, the great "isms" (liberalism, conservatism, socialism, etc.) of the 19th century and World War I, together with a great number of fascinating personalities such as Vladimir Lenin, the Romanov czars and czarinas, and Rasputin who helped create conditions that led to the Russian Revolution of 1917. Join us as we explore the causes of one of the most significant revolutions in history by analyzing some of the important events and people of the 19th and 20th centuries. A subsequent course will be planned to cover the years following the Russian Revolution of 1917 and the rise of the Communist party.

<u>Instructor</u>: Kathryn Cross received a B.A. degree in European History and Journalism from Washington and Lee University in 2002. She was awarded a M.S. in European History from Old Dominion University in 2008. Kathryn has taught advanced placement Modern European History at Nansemond Suffolk Academy from 2002-2010. Many ILR members will recall some of her outstanding earlier programs: The Renaissance, The Reformation, The French Revolution and Mary, Queen of Scots.

Art historical study of Chinese landscape painting investigates its varied characteristics, such as the symbolism of rocks, trees, and water; the vocabulary of strokes and washes and their correlation with calligraphy; and the societal value of retreat into nature. This class will explore the chronological development of landscape painting in China, as well as its place in a broader Asian cultural tradition.

Instructor: Joyce Bernstein Howell has a Ph.D. in Art History from the University of Virginia. She is Professor of Art History at Virginia Wesleyan College.

Course Description: A humorous approach to understanding the guidelines and rules for developing foreign policy analysis; this course is designed to provide easy, step-by-step approaches for deconstructing contemporary foreign policy issues and problems. Through model group exercises, the steps for understanding the construction of policy development in Afghanistan, Israel, Egypt, Pakistan, etc., will be examined. A recommended bibliography will be provided for those interested in supplementing their knowledge of this field.

<u>Instructor</u>: A tenured associate professor in the Department of Political Science of Norfolk State University, Carol J. Pretlow is a graduate of Fisk University (B.A. in Political Science), Norfolk State University (M.A. in Mass Communications) and The American University Washington College of Law (J.D./LL.M in International Law).

As founding Director of the Consortium for Strategic and Global Studies (Housed in the NSU College of Liberal Arts), the professor has been an adjunct professor of foreign policy at The National Defense University Joint Forces Staff College in Norfolk, a visiting professor at Tongji University in Shanghai, China (2001), a research fellow at the Lauterpachet Centre of International Law of Cambridge University, United Kingdom (2005-2009) and at the W.E.B DuBois Institute for African-American Studies at Harvard University in Cambridge, MA (1999). Most recently, Professor Pretlow has been a regular guest on the WHRO (Channel 15) – "Another View".

Firearms, Safety and Introduction to Handguns

<u>Course Description</u>: This class offers an introduction to firearms safety, followed by a hands-on demonstration of different sizes and types of handguns, to include full-size and snub-nose revolvers and full-size and concealable semi-automatic pistols. It will include a discussion of different calibers of ammunition and the effects of ammunition on the human body, as well as ammunition used exclusively for target shooting. <u>No actual firing of guns</u> will take place during the class. However, anyone wishing to practice at the shooting range may do so at the end of the class. Handguns are available for rental at the shooting range. Estimated cost for renting is about \$40.00, depending on type and caliber of handgun to be rented.

<u>Course Description</u>: An examination of the myriad threats facing the planet's oceans from overfishing to ocean acidification caused by carbon emissions to pollution from oil and other sources.

<u>Instructor</u>: Mike D'Orso graduated from William & Mary in 1975 with a degree in Philosophy and got his M.A. in 1981. He got his start with *The Williamsburg Paper* and *The Virginian-Pilot* and has gone on to write 15 books of narrative non-fiction. Seven have been best sellers and have been nominated for a Pulitzer. He has appeared on "Oprah", C-Span's "Book-TV", MSNBC, numerous NPR Radio programs, including Michael Feldman's "Whatd'Ya Know?" His new book, which he co-authored with actor/activist, Ted Danson, came out this April and for which this course is named. Mike has talked to us before and has been guest speaker at an ILR annual luncheon. He is co-author with actor and activist Ted Danson of *Oceana: Our Endangered Oceans and What We Can Do to Save Them.* Mike D'Orso's work includes 15 books; seven have been bestsellers and three have been nominated for the Pulitzer Prize.

Course Description: Under the free exercise clause of the First Amendment, the government is prevented from getting in the way of people's ability to practice their religious beliefs. At the same time, religious practice oftentimes becomes actionable behavior, that the federal and state governments can regulate. How can the average citizen, under such circumstances, ever be sure if the practice of his/her beliefs is actually religion or unprotected conduct?

<u>Instructor</u>: Dr. Sheffer received his B.A. and M.A. from Hunter College and City University of New York and a Ph.D. from the New School for Social Research. Since 2000 he has taught university-level summer sessions on the American Presidency, Constitutional Law, and American Government for the Junior Statesman of America Foundation at Princeton and Georgetown Universities. His classes for ILR are always thought provoking.

"An Angler in the Lake of Darkness":

The Emperor Nero's Misspent Youth and Reign

<u>Course Description</u>: As the quotation from *King Lear* in the title of this course nicely illustrates, Nero is one of the most easily recognized ruler-villains of all times. Arsonist, fratricide, matricide, uxoricide, persecutor of the Church, and even more unflattering appellations, most of them indisputably true, have been bestowed on Lucious Domitius Ahenobarbus (as he was named at birth) since his death in 68 A.D. It is not without cause, then, that throughout western history moralists seeking a model of a ruler who was not just bad, but *wicked*, have turned instinctively to Nero.

This class does NOT attempt to rehabilitate Nero's reputation or excuse his atrocities, but rather to consider why it is that this one figure, many of whose predecessors did equally despicable deeds, has become synonymous with evil incarnate. Come join us for a lively discussion of a ruler who, if seldom lovable, was never boring!

<u>Instructor</u>: Dr. Benjamin Haller received his B.A. in Classics from William & Mary (Summa Cum Laude) and was a member of the American School of Classical Studies in Athens, 2001. He went on to his M.A. and Ph.D. at the University of Pittsburgh. He has been teaching at Virginia Wesleyan College for the past three years and is highly recommended to ILR by Dr. Clayton Drees.

Course Description: These are mental health conditions we are hearing about in relation to our grandchildren and our neighborhood children. These conditions just do not disappear and many older folks probably have dealt with them as well. What exactly are they, how can they be diagnosed and treated, and what is the prognosis? EVMS is involved in research and study and Dr. Deutsch will be sharing this information with us as well as opening the floor for discussion of other related psychological topics of interest to the group.

<u>Instructor</u>: Dr. Stephen Deutsch is the current chairman of the EVMS Dept. of Psychiatry, and a Board Certified Psychiatrist. He is also a Fellow of the American College of Neuropsychopharmacology.

The Involvement of Princess Anne County, Virginia, in the Civil War

Date: Tuesday, Nov. 29, 10:00 – 12:00 Noon

<u>Course Description</u>: At the outbreak of the Civil War, the Citizens of Princess Anne County, since annexed as part of the City of Virginia Beach, voted unanimously to join the Confederacy in their fight against Union oppression. Just over one year later, after nearly 700 men from this tiny farming community left to join the Confederate forces, it fell under Union occupation and remained under Union occupation for the duration for the war.

During this session, Princess Anne County born and raised historian and author Kenneth Harris will discuss the occupation: the robbery, looting, burning, and further degradations the remaining Princess Anne residents endured. These residents dealt with the occupation through guerilla activities in and around Princess Anne County southward to, and including, Knotts Island, NC; however, the local Confederate guerilla forces paid for their activities.

Some of these sites had previously been lost or destroyed by development.

TOUR THE MILITARY AVIATION MUSEUM

November 4, 2011 at 1000 Hours

(10:00 a.m. for you civilians!)

The Military Aviation Museum, located about 3½ miles south of Pungo on Princess Anne Road, may be the newest cultural attraction in Tidewater. It is certainly one of the largest with 103 acres, a 5,000 foot grass runway, 65,000 sq. ft. of exhibition space, five new buildings and over 30 aircraft, all but 2 of them flyable. The inventory includes a B-17, a Spitfire, a Corsair, trainers, fighters, bombers and liaison aircraft as well as other British aircraft and German aircraft and vehicles. The WW I hangar has over a dozen flying replicas of WW I aircraft. There is also a wonderful aviation museum for browsing after the tour proper.

A knowledgeable docent who will discuss the history and events associated with the aircraft on display will lead the ILR tour. The tour is planned to last about an hour and a half. **The cost is \$15.00 per person**. Some of us may wish to follow the tour with lunch at the Sea Crest Restaurant in Pungo.

<u>Directions</u>: From Pungo, go south on Princess Anne Road a few miles until, on the <u>right side</u>, you see a water tower, then the huge hangar, and finally the dinosaurs. There's a sign by the entrance road; they have a very nice parking lot.





The three punched holes on the new pass indicate the <u>6-month expiration date</u>. For ex., this pass was issued on 9/1/11, so the date punched is MAR 01 - (Mar. 1, 2012).

ODU now has NEW (blue) parking passes; passes are issued in 6-month blocks (ODU policy). ((The gold 'Extended Parking Permit' is being phased out; but, if you have one and it's still valid, you can use it until the expiration date)). The new passes can either hang from the car's rear-view mirror or be placed on the driver's side of dashboard.

All lots are "DECAL CONTROLLED," and with more organizations and schools using the VBHEC facilities, parking regulations are going to be more strictly enforced.

Parking Services: "Anyone parking at the VBHEC campus must have a *current* parking pass."

<u>Parking passes are issued to ILR members when they register for classes</u>, and are updated, as needed. If you have an expired pass, or near expired, simply call our office (368-4160) or stop by, and a new one will be issued.
